
## Barriers to success

### Title I WIOA

NMT enrolled 281 vouth the first six WIOA ENROLLMENT months of the program Youth Adult 26.2% 37.6% NMT served almost half of the Dislocated Workers in the state, as evidenced by the new enrollment of 335 Dislocated Workers so Dislocated far this year. Worker 36.2% Data through 12/31/2018

The three programs had an average placement wage of \$17.67.

NMT enrolled 420 adults between July 1, 2018 and December 31, 2018.

The Career Service Provider for Northern Middle Tennessee is Workforce Essentials. In the Middle Tennessee Region, 64% of adults, 73% of dislocated workers, and 56% of youth enrollments are served by our LWDA. From a statewide perspective, Northern Middle Tennessee serves 19% of all adults, 45% of all dislocated workers, and 28% of all youth enrollments across the state.
