AJC Visits



Things to note:

- We rank 1st out of 13 LWDAs in AJC traffic.
- Affiliate Centers host 53% of visits, and Comprehensive Centers host 47% of visits.
- Through the first six months of the program year, we are experiencing an average 100 fewer visits per month by location than prior year.
- Across the state, AJC visits average 10,875 through Sept. 30. Through the same date, LWDA 8 has assisted 23,861 through our AJC network.


Co-enrollments allow customers to receive a variety of services from multiple partners. We are working to capture additional co-enrollment data across a variety of information platforms from other partners.




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Title I WIOA

Collaboration Corner

Two local American Job Centers, in partnership with community judicial systems, jails, and employers, have launched innovative inmate transition programs with county jails. The Sumner County program includes job preparedness workshops in the jail, followed by interviews with local employers. Hired inmates are transported by Workforce Essentials to and from the work site each day. This experience allows the inmates to continue steady employment upon release. In Williamson County, AJC staff work extensively with inmates who are near their release date to prepare them for the successful employment. Inmates also have the opportunity to interview with employers while still incarcerated, ensuring employment upon release, facilitating a smooth re-entry into the workforce.

Title IV Voc Rehab

Vocational Rehabilitation serves 741 customers in LWDA 8, including 130 new enrollments since the beginning of the program year. The local program ranks **3rd** in the state in new enrollments.
